This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

Jesus tells us that God loves all of his children, deserving and undeserving. He calls us to imitate this allembracing love of God. However, we know how difficult it can be to follow this commandment, especially when it comes to those who have wronged us or that we simply may not like.

In the Old Testament, the commandment: "You must love your neighbour as yourself" is restricted to fellow Israelites. But now Jesus broadens this to include everyone, Gentiles as well as Jews, enemies as well as friends. Why? Because this is the way that the heavenly Father acts. He shows equal love towards good and bad, not because he is indifferent to morality, but because he loves without limit.

'Love our enemies?'...Most of us find it hard enough to love our friends sometimes. All of us have enemies, or at least people that we dislike. Why is it that we dislike these particular people? Something they said or did to us? Enemies expose a side of us which we usually manage to keep hidden from our friends, a dark side of our nature which we would rather not know about.

But we can make a decision to love someone even though we do not have feelings of love for that person. To love an enemy goes contrary to our human nature. Only God can help us to love in the way Christ asks of us.

We pray that the Lord helps us to be merciful and forgiving towards those who make life difficult for us, to rise above our human weakness and to keep us faithful in loving God and one another.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is one of the most popular and important holy days in the liturgical calendar. It marks the start of the season of Lent, a season of fasting and prayer. Following the example of the Ninevites, who did penance in sackcloth and ashes, our foreheads are marked with ashes to humble our hearts and reminds us that life passes away on Earth. We remember this when we are told "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." or "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

Ashes are a symbol of penance made sacramental by the blessing of the Church, and they help us develop a spirit of humility and sacrifice.

The distribution of ashes comes from a ceremony of ages past. Christians who had committed grave faults performed public penance. On Ash Wednesday, the Bishop blessed the hair shirts which they were to wear during the forty days of penance, and sprinkled over them ashes made from the palms from the previous year. Then, while the faithful recited the Seven Penitential Psalms, the penitents were turned out of the church because of their sins -- just as Adam, the first man, was turned out of Paradise because of his disobedience. The penitents did not enter the church again until Maundy Thursday after having won reconciliation by the toil of forty days' penance and sacramental absolution. Later, all Christians, whether public or secret penitents, came to receive ashes out of devotion. In earlier times, the distribution of ashes was followed by a penitential procession.

The ashes are made from the blessed palms used in the Palm Sunday celebration of the previous year. The ashes are christened with Holy Water and are scented by exposure to incense. While the ashes symbolize penance and contrition, they are also a reminder that God is gracious and merciful to those who call on Him with repentant hearts. His Divine mercy is of utmost importance during the season of Lent, and the Church calls on us to seek that mercy during the entire Lenten season with reflection, prayer and penance.

We will have two Masses on Ash Wednesday one at 10:30 a.m. preceded by Confessions at 10:00 a.m., and a Mass at 7:30 p.m. with Confessions at 7:00 p.m. We will also hold our first set of Stations of the Cross at 12:00 noon on that day too, walking the way of sorrow with our Lord at the start of our Lenten journey.
