This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

In today's Gospel Jesus says to all of us, "Come to Me, all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Jesus recognised that the ruling elite, the Pharisees, placed heavy burdens on the people. The way that some of them treated the ordinary citizen was more of a hindrance than a help. In the first part of the Gospel, Jesus recognises the pride of those who have failed to understand what serving God means. At the same time, he thanks the Father for revealing 'these things' to 'mere children,' or the humblest and simplest in society.

The Pharisees made God's law a trial, full of heavy burdens. Every aspect of Jewish life was covered in 613 Mosaic Laws with many thousands of interpretations. In contrast, Jesus describes the yoke he offers.

"Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light."

Jesus tells us that it is only in Him that we can find God. He speaks to all of us who are desperately trying to find God, who are trying to lead good lives but often fall short, worn out by the world around us. The yoke that Christ offers us is a yoke where we are not expected to work on our own but rather use the strength of Christ to pull us along. The yoke he refers to is the knowledge that God will only send us trials that He knows are within our capabilities to overcome.

However, though He tells us that his burden is light, it does not mean that the burden will be easy to carry. Even the heaviest burden is laid upon us in love, and if we return that love toward God and man, then the burden becomes easy.

The burdens we face, such as bills to pay, debts to clear, relationships to mend, health worries and many more, can stop us from being receptive to the voice of God. Whenever we can, we should be looking to help others with their burdens. This can be as simple as a kind word or gesture, letting someone know they are not alone in what they face. We can also do this by reflecting on how our own words and actions may increase the burden on others.

This week let us pray that we can all alleviate the burdens which weigh us and others down. The burden of fear and ignorance around God's mercy and compassion. If we find ourselves struggling with a burden, let us turn to Jesus and remember his words, "Come to me."

Sacramental Preparation

Sacrament of Marriage: Catholics must approach the Parish Priest / Deacon, at least 6 months prior to their intended wedding, and before setting a wedding date.

Making an Act of Spiritual Communion

When we cannot fulfil our obligation to attend Mass on a Sunday or Holy Day of Obligation, whether because of illness or bad weather, or some other reason outside of our control, we can, and indeed should make an Act of Spiritual Communion. It is also good to make an Act of Spiritual Communion when we can attend Mass, but when something prevents us from receiving sacramental Communion that day—say, a mortal sin that we know we have not had the opportunity to confess yet.

We can make an act multiple times a day—even on days when we have been able to receive the Eucharist; because each Act of Spiritual Communion that we make increases our desire to receive sacramental Communion, and also helps us to avoid the sins that would make us unable to receive Communion worthily.

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there, and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

Recap of Instructions for Mass from 4th July 2020

- Please remember to book a slot every week for the weekend Masses. If you are not tech savvy, please ask someone to book a slot for you.
- Please do not turn up "on spec" on a Saturday evening or Sunday morning, we really have no wish to turn people away from Mass, but when we are full, we are full.
- Holy Communion, for those who wish to receive it, will be given **AFTER** Mass. Please come forward as directed by the Priest/Deacon. Immediately after you have received, please leave the Church, following "the one-way system."
- You cannot receive Holy Communion whilst wearing gloves. Please remove these before sanitising your hands with the hand sanitiser and coming to Holy Communion.
- Please do not come to Mass if you are isolating or show any symptoms of illness.
- Please do not reserve seats in Church for friends. Everyone will be seated by a steward working to a plan from those who have booked a place.
- The toilets in Church will remain closed.
- All aspects of the liturgy, including readings, ministering of Holy Communion, setting for and clearing away from Mass will be carried out by the Priest and Deacon to minimise risks.
- Above all please be patient. It is a difficult and strange situation and we are seeking to implement plans set by a number of different people with different agendas, and we are all doing are best to keep you safe and to return us all to the Sacraments of the Church.
