# This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the landowner who hires labourers for his vineyard to show us the kind of labour relations that God has with us.

In Jesus' time, the Jews had the mentality that salvation could and must be earned simply by keeping the law and its commands. Jesus was strongly against that conception and said that nobody should think that he had earned his salvation or anything from God. He could only be grateful before him.

In this parable, Jesus teaches grace and mercy and shapes our attitudes according to the truth that God's gift of salvation is free. The men in the parable who had worked all day believed that the men who had worked less than they would receive less. When seeing that all workers received the same amount, they got upset and cried "not fair." The Landowner replied, "Are you envious because I am generous?" Justice is about merit; generosity is about need. These workers talked justice, but God talked generosity and mercy.

Theologians of all times had tried to reconcile God's justice and his mercy. But St. Therese of Lisieux simply said, "God's justice is his mercy." God is just but he is also merciful. If God were strictly just to us, we would all be in trouble. The good news is that God is more than just to us, he is generous. This is where our hope stands.

When we see someone else is more successful than we are, we should not be envious but assume that there is a reason for it. We can become pre-occupied with the injustice we see around us, especially when wrongdoing and the wrongdoer seems to go unpunished. We have no control, and no right to pass judgement on the way that God bestows blessings on others, we should only look for the blessings we receive and give thanks for them.

God said to Isaiah, "My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways,". Let's be grateful to God for his goodness, his love, and his mercy.

### Making an Act of Spiritual Communion

When we cannot fulfil our obligation to attend Mass on a Sunday or Holy Day of Obligation, whether because of illness or bad weather, or some other reason outside of our control, we can, and indeed should make an Act of Spiritual Communion. It is also good to make an Act of Spiritual Communion when we can attend Mass, but when something prevents us from receiving sacramental Communion that day—say, a mortal sin that we know we have not had the opportunity to confess yet.

We can make an act multiple times a day—even on days when we have been able to receive the Eucharist; because each Act of Spiritual Communion that we make increases our desire to receive sacramental Communion, and also helps us to avoid the sins that would make us unable to receive Communion worthily.

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there, and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

#### **Parish News**

**Mass Numbers:** The good news is that over the last few weeks attendance at the 18:00 vigil Mass has been growing. It is truly wonderful to see you all coming to celebrate the Eucharist of the Lord. The not so good news is that, as you know, we are limited on the number of parishioners that can attend Mass and the Vigil Mass is nearing our current capacity. We would prefer not to turn people away should these numbers continue to increase and need to revert to the booking system. Perhaps you may be able to help by considering the 8:30 a.m. Sunday Mass where there is still capacity. Additionally, with the revoked obligation to attend Mass on a Sunday, our weekday Masses have more capacity if you are able to attend those. We are trying to ensure that everyone who would like, can have the opportunity to attend Mass. Thank you.

**Our Lady of Walsingham – Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> September:** This Thursday we celebrate the feast day of Our Lady of Walsingham. Within the Ordinariate this is a Solemnity. As Fr. Lee, is an Ordinariate priest, he will be celebrating this Mass using Divine Worship: The Missal. All are welcome to attend the Mass.

**Face Coverings:** Face coverings are mandatory in Places of Worship and are required unless you are exempt from doing so or under the age of 11.

Holy Communion: Communion on the tongue is presently not permitted and can only be received in the hand. Parishioners are asked to wait in their pews until instructed to move forward for Holy Communion by the Stewards, always being aware of the regulations on social distancing in the orderly queue. When you approach Fr. Lee/Deacon Des, please do so with arms at "full stretch" to maintain good distance. one on top of the other forming a 'throne'. <u>Once received, cover the host with the free hand to ensure it is not dropped, and then move to the right, away from the Fr. Lee/Deacon Des. Pause and unloop your face mask, consume the blessed sacrament and then re-apply your mask and leave the church. Under no circumstances should the host be consumed after leaving the church.</u>

**Maintaining Social Distancing before and after Mass:** Please make note of the guidance issued by the Bishops of England and Wales. Worshippers should limit their interactions with anyone they are not attending church with, i.e. if they are attending corporate worship with one other household, wherever possible they should maintain social distancing with anyone outside of this group.

Please do not congregate outside the church, this also includes the grounds and the car park. Thank you.


**Donations:** Gift Aid envelopes for the current financial year are available; should you wish to have them, please contact Clair in the office and she will arrange for them to be delivered to you.
