All our personnel (including clergy, religious, staff and volunteers) have a responsibility to safeguard our children and vulnerable adults and we will support their best interests and guard against abuse.

We actively promote best practice and seek to ensure that our children and vulnerable adults feel safe, are safe and will be safe.

What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding is creating safe environments for children and vulnerable adults to ensure they are free from all forms of abuse.

How we safeguard in St. Theresa's

- ✓ We have a Parish safeguarding representative
- ✓ We have clear policies, procedures and guidelines
- ✓ We have trained safeguarding personnel
- ✓ We practice safer recruitment
- ✓ We carry out police vetting
- ✓ We have children friendly posters
- ✓ We have information leaflets for parents/carers/guardians
- ✓ We assist external agencies to investigate and prosecute offences.

To assist us in being a Safe Church you can take PART in helping us keep our vulnerable members safe:

- Proactive: Familiarise yourself with safeguarding through our policies, statements and even training. (you are welcome to attend).
- Awareness: Be vigilant and alert to what you see or hear.
- Responsibility: Looking away is not an option.
- > Tell: Nothing is too trivial to tell one of our safeguarders.
