This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

The Gospel today shows Jesus healing a deaf man. Mark in this Gospel passage shows Jesus fulfilling the prophecy contained in the first reading: 'The ears of the deaf will be unsealed, and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy.' In other words, Jesus is the one who will bring salvation to Israel.

This Gospel passage at first sight may appear as having not much relevance to us today. However, we would be very much mistaken.

Even if we do not have physical handicaps to contend with, the fact is that many of us are wounded and suffering. These inner wounds may be because of childhood trauma or grief, or failure at work or in relationships.

We can also be wounded by our inability to forgive and to let go of past wrongs and hurts. Many of the worst kinds of suffering are not visible to the naked eye.

Jesus healed the man physically and gave him the gift of hearing and speech. Jesus also heals us if we allow him to. The first step to healing is to recognise that we are suffering and that we trust God to heal us. This may take some time and perhaps cause us to think that God is not listening to us. We may even miss the healing offered to us because we do not see or hear the signs being given to us.

The gift of hearing and speech should not be wasted, and we may need the Lord's healing touch if we are to put these gifts to good use. This miracle contained in the Gospel made its way into the rite of Baptism and is still contained within it today, even if it is not practised at every baptism. The minister touches the ears and mouth of the person being baptised and says, 'The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb

speak. May he soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father.'

These are important words, and it underlines that the greatest tragedy is not necessarily to be born deaf and dumb like the man cured by Jesus, but rather to have ears and yet fail to hear and to have tongues and yet fail to speak. This week we should pray that we always listen to the word of God and always profess that word with our lips and in how we live our lives.

Parish News

COVID Guidance: From Monday 19th July many of the legal restrictions around measures to prevent the spread of COVID -19 were lifted in England. This does not mean that coronavirus has gone away. We will have to learn to live with COVID -19 for the foreseeable future, managing the risk for ourselves and others.

The guidance issued by the Bishops' Conference, whilst encouraging, enables us to move forward with a cautious approach, allowing us to take local infection rates etc. into consideration when keeping/removing certain restrictions.

The following guidance is in place at St. Theresa's for the time being:

- ➤ Holy Water Stoups are still not permitted.
- ➤ Holy Communion will continue to be under one kind and Fr. Lee/Deacon Des will continue to sanitise their hands beforehand. Communion is recommended to be distributed in the hand but those who wish to receive on the tongue may do so.
- > The wearing of face coverings in church will be down to personal choice and is no longer required by law. We would encourage the continuation of masks if desirable.
- ➤ Benches will, for the time being, remain socially distanced with a view to moving everything back to normal in September 2021.
- ➤ We shall continue to provide hand sanitiser at the entrances/exit and encourage people to continue using them.
- We shall endeavour to keep the large front doors open to ensure some ventilation in church.
- ➤ We shall continue to clean the church, paying particular attention to common touch points such as door handles.
- > Our QR Code will remain visible for those who wish to scan it via the NHS App.
- We ask anyone feeling unwell or anyone who tests positive for COVID to please stay at home.

At present it is the intention of the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales, to reintroduce the Obligation to be at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation from the 1st Sunday of Advent (28th November 2021), until that time, it remains suspended. We shall look to slowly reintroduce those things that have been suspended due to COVID over the next few months and will of course communicate these to you. We will continue to follow the guidance issued and take local information into consideration to keep everybody as safe as we can. Thank you.
