This Week's Good News


Dear Friends,

Each of the Gospels begins with an account on Jesus' origins. Mark introduces Jesus to us as an adult, telling us that Jesus was a man from Nazareth whose advent fulfils the arrival of God's salvation as foretold by the prophet Isaiah. Matthew and Luke's narratives begin earlier still, recounting Jesus' very conception and birth in the prophecies of old and God's will to deliver humanity.

John, however, begins his account of Jesus, the word, going back to the beginning of time itself. Before anything else had been created, He was. Jesus, as the divine Logos, was not only with God in the beginning, but was God. John's prologue reveals to us that creation itself originated from his life-giving agency. This text is extremely important in shaping Christian conceptions of Jesus' divinity, the incarnation, and the Trinity.

John stresses that to see Jesus is to see the Father. John's opening introduces several themes that will dominate the narrative that follows. In addition to his exaltation of Jesus as the Divine Logos, four interrelated motifs – all speaking to Jesus' purpose as the word of God – are particularly prominent. Firstly, John stresses that "the world came into being through him". Jesus was integral to the formation of the earth and all its creatures. Secondly, John presents Jesus as the source of revelation and grace for humankind. He is "the true light which enlightens everyone".

Also included here is the world's rejection of Jesus: "He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; Yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him." Finally, John's prologue reveals that the Divine Word became incarnate among us and



within humanity: "and the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." In Jesus, the barriers between the divine and human realms are breached to a degree never before realised.

Ultimately, the Divine Word becomes so enmeshed in the world that he willingly undertakes humiliation and death on a cross to enlighten all those who would receive him. From his "fullness we have received grace in return for grace." The Word was the true light, that came into a world of darkness to light the way to salvation. Today, more than ever, we need this divine light in our lives to help us to see the path that leads to eternal joy.

COVID19 - Bishops' Conference Guidance: Following the statement by the Prime Minister on Wednesday 9th December, further restrictions have been imposed to mitigate against viral transmission, especially in the light of the new Omicron variant. The following guidance has been issued by the Bishops of England and Wales:

- **Face Coverings** The wearing of face covering is now mandatory in Places of Worship. However, there will be exemptions for those leading worship, public proclamation of scriptural readings or prayers, and those who are unable to wear face coverings and are exempt for medical reasons.
- **Singing** The current Church guidance states that congregational singing should take place with face coverings in place and choirs and soloists may sing without such coverings. As the Church moves towards Christmas celebrations which often involves carol services and other singing events, it is strongly recommended that congregational singing within church buildings continues with the applied face coverings.
- **Practical Guidance for Churches -** With respect to the current situation with the Omicron variant it is important to ensure the following points are followed in our churches:
 - That people displaying any symptoms of Covid-19 should stay at home and not travel to church or participate in person.
 - That hand sanitiser is available to those attending the Church.
 - Face coverings must be worn by those attending public acts of worship unless there is a genuine exemption or the person is leading worship or participating in a role that requires the mask to be removed for a period of time.
 - That there is good ventilation and air throughput in the building; in this case, because of climatic conditions, it would be important to remind people to wrap up well in church.
 - There is now very strong evidence to support that the main mode of this variant's viral transmission is through aerosols, and that the risk from surface and touch transmission is very small indeed. As such, the strict regimes of church cleaning that were recommended at the beginning of the opening of churches for public worship are no longer necessary. General church cleaning is sufficient.
 - That people who are engaged in a form of pastoral ministry which involves ministry to the housebound, sick and vulnerable, should take regular lateral flow tests to ensure they are safe to do so. These are free from the NHS.
