#### This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

Last week we were made aware of our call to share in the prophetic ministry of Jesus. In our readings today we explore this further in considering vocation and discipleship. We are helped by the wonderful stories given to us of the calls of the Prophet Isaiah, and the disciples Peter and Paul. We are dealing with profound religious experiences that have shaped and determined our awareness of God's action in our lives.

Simon Peter, the fisherman, is the first to be called personally by Jesus in Luke's Gospel. His calling resembles Isaiah's commissioning in the First Reading: confronted with the holiness of the Lord, both Peter and Isaiah are overwhelmed by a sense of their own sinfulness and inadequacy. Yet each experiences the Lord's forgiveness and is sent to preach the good news of His mercy to the world. No one is "fit to be called an apostle," Paul recognises in today's second reading. But by "the grace of God," even a persecutor of the Church, as Paul once was, can be lifted up for the Lord's service as an apostle.

Simon put out into deep waters even though, as a professional fisherman, he knew it would be foolish to expect to catch anything. In humbling himself before the Lord's command, he was exalted, his nets filled to overflowing; later, as Paul tells us, he will become the first to see the risen Lord.

Isaiah's mystical experience in the temple can be seen to have little in common with the story of fishing on the Sea of Galilee, but they have remarkable parallels. In different sets of imagery, God reveals Himself: there is a human confrontation with the Divine, whether this is the LORD seated high on His throne, or Jesus teaching and fishing with the labourers at their nets. There is the perception of wonder, be



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it at the heavenly majesty of holiness, or the overwhelming generosity and insight of Jesus. In both cases it leads to a sense of unworthiness: "What a wretched state I am in", and "Leave me, Lord, for I am a sinful man". Yet the Lord is here with you, but more than that, he *wants* you. It is not so much that either man is sinful personally, but each is deeply aware of the limitations and wretchedness of humanity, of the imperfect human condition.

Confrontation with the All-Holy should lead to alienation and a sense of futility, but to our utter surprise it does quite the opposite; holiness cleanses, and, for the open heart which recognises and accepts forgiveness, there is a change, invitation, and call to purification. Isaiah and the disciples can now hear the question: "whom shall I send?" and grasp the intention: "I will make you fishers of men." There is a new impression of hope, strength, and purpose: "here I am, send me." "They left everything and followed him."

The stories of great sinners who were called, like St Paul, and St Augustine, illustrate this image, and gives us hope too. If men like these can be called by God, and be used to fulfil his divine plan, then so can we. However far we have travelled from God, the distance back to Him is very small indeed, and we need to come back so that we can be part of his divine plan for the world.

#### **Parish News**

**COVID19 – Bishops' Conference Guidance:** The guidance below has been issued by the Bishops of England and Wales following the removal of restrictions by HM Government on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2022.

- Those attending an act of worship may continue to wear a face covering (both nose and mouth) whilst in the church building.
- There is no need for formal social distancing in church buildings, although those present should be sensitive to the needs of others around them.
- Churches should continue to ensure there is good ventilation, balancing this against the need for church heating, especially at this time.
- It is clear from scientific evidence that transmission from surfaces (touch transmission) is now minimal and so the use of hymn books, missals and other worship aids can be resumed with immediate effect.
- Whilst it is still good practice to sanitise hands on entry and exit of churches, there is no need for readers (or other ministers) to sanitise their hands before reading or performing other ministries in the church. All ministers of Holy Communion (clergy and lay people) should still sanitise their hands for the distribution of Holy Communion.
- Holy water stoups may be refilled but care should be seen that the water is changed regularly (at a minimum of once a week). Usual forms of church cleaning are sufficient.
- Regarding the liturgical action, there should be a return to the normal mode of celebrating Mass respecting the integrity of the Rite. This would include the reintroduction of the Prayer of the Faithful (where this has not been reinstated already), the Sign of Peace may be offered again if felt appropriate, and Holy Communion should be distributed at the usual place and in the usual mode (i.e. with the faithful approaching the minister in an orderly procession). For the time being, Holy Communion must continue to be given under one kind only (the Sacred Host) and for

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concelebrations of clergy, intinction of the Precious Blood with the Sacred Host should continue to be used.

• Congregational singing may continue and there is a general encouragement to wear face coverings while singing. However, it is recognised that not everyone will feel able to do this.

**Our Synodal Journey Together:** As part of the preparation for the Synod of Bishops in October 2023, Pope Francis has asked all people worldwide to input into the process. "Whilst what is under discussion at synodal gatherings are not the traditional truths of Christian doctrine. The Synod should develop how our teaching can be lived and applied in the changing contexts of our time".

The Diocese of Brentwood has launched its Synodal Pathway. We, as a parish, are now undergoing a time for listening and to share our thoughts. At each weekend Mass during February, we will include the Synodal prayer in our Bidding Prayers. During February all groups and individuals are asked to reflect on our teaching and record our thoughts for the future of the Church. Maybe even set up your own house group for a discussion.

After reflecting on the Synodal prayer please think about the Catholic Church that you would like to see. Your thoughts are wanted so much, we have three methods to collect them. Firstly, we will be holding a meeting after each Mass on the weekend 26/27th February. Secondly, we will have a computer link to the Diocesan Survey for individuals to submit their thoughts and lastly, we will have printed copies of the same survey for those that would prefer not to use computers. Please use any (or all) of the methods. The Diocese will collect our input and prepare a report in April which will go first Country wide. Then continental and finally as an input to the Synod in October 2023.
