Thought from Fr Liam... The Church is Synodal

Dear Friends

On his recent visit to Canada Pope Francis reflected once again that the 'Church is either synodal, or it is not Church' - underlining without ambiguity that synodality is the norm for our way of being Church.

Well the Sunday before last in Rome, Pope Francis continued to *put his money where his mouth is*, as they say, by announcing a year-long extension of our current Synod process to October 2024. Pope Francis has decided to celebrate this final phase of the Synod process in two sessions, October 2023 and October 2024 so that the 'theme of a Synodal Church, because of its breadth and importance, might be the subject of prolonged discernment not only by the members of the Synodal Assembly, **but by the whole Church...**I trust that this decision' Francis concludes 'will promote the understanding of synodality as a constitutive dimension of the Church, and help everyone to live it as the journey of brothers and sisters who proclaim the joy of the Gospel.' This is an invitation that we will return to later in the year here in **St Theresa's** as we continue our own parish synod journey.

At the heart of synod is listening - but why the fuss I hear you ask with all this listening?

The significance of listening across our tradition, from Jesus himself, through the scriptures and the many expressions of church that have followed, is manifestly evident – not that the Church's practice across the

generations has always lived up to this sadly. Listening is a defining practice for a follower of Jesus and for what it means to be Church.

We are called to continually listen to each other within and beyond our Church, to the Holy Spirit echoing and breathing within each one of us - to those familiar voices, but also especially to those voices who have been quietened or silenced, marginalised or excluded by our church, for 'in all the baptised, from first to last, the sanctifying power of the Spirit is at work.' Indeed as Dietrich Bonhoeffer insightfully observed 'we should listen with the ears of God, so that we can speak the Word of God.'

As we prepare to celebrate the feast of All Saints this week, we are reminded that each one of us through our baptismal vocation is called to holiness and to work together to help the kingdom of God's justice break through into our world.

Let us continue to listen for the least breath of the Spirit in the lives of each person we encounter and thus listen attentively to 'what the Spirit is saying to the Churches.'

This Week's Good News

Dear Friends.

Today we hear the story of Jesus and his encounter with another Tax Collector, Zacchaeus. A senior Tax official, he hears that Jesus is in town and hurries out to try and see him. Small in stature, Zacchaeus climbs a sycamore tree and sits in it in the hope of seeing Jesus.

As he sits there Jesus passes by and looks up and calls Zacchaeus by name and tells him to come down as he must stay at his house that very day. Zacchaeus is filled with joy and comes down and is so overjoyed at not being rejected by Jesus that he promises to sell half of his property and give it to the poor and to make amends to anyone he has cheated.

Our very own St Therese of Lisieux once wrote to her sister Celine that Jesus revealed much to them by making them climb a mystical tree and that Jesus invited them to come down as he wanted to stay at their house. Jesus in the same way invites us to come down quickly as he wants to stay at our house today. Jesus calls us by name and invites us to let go of the things that keep us from him. Things such as pride, anger, jealousy, and pre-occupation with the things of the world. If we focus on God, then we can listen intently as he calls us by name.

If we do so, then we can feel the same joy that Zacchaeus felt. However, we can only do this by climbing down and letting go of everything that damages our relationship with God. Abandoning the things that cause us to sin and to distance ourselves from God's mercy. Let each of us welcome Jesus into our homes every day of our lives.

He founded the Plowshares movement, which broke into a US Nuclear facility and damaged the nose cones of Nuclear warheads. He was arrested over 90 times for his activism and died at the age of 94 in 2016.
