This Week's Good News

Dear Friends.

Today we remember all of the fallen in two world wars, as well as in all the conflicts since then. The conflict during 1914-1918 was known as the 'war to end all wars'. The savagery and tremendous loss of life during those four years of fighting saw whole generations killed. Boys and their fathers from villages across the land, signed up to serve King and Country and marched off to war, with many of them never to return home again.

Since that terrible conflict, the world has hardly ever enjoyed any period of sustained peace. World War II, Korea, Vietnam, the Falklands war, Iraq, Afghanistan and Iraq again. We also remember the fallen who died in another war, a war fought within the British Isles, the war known as the 'Troubles' in Northern Ireland and which lasted some thirty years.

Today we witness another tragedy as we see death and destruction on our TV screens in Ukraine. The list of conflicts since that great war in Europe during 1914-1918 are countless when one includes the deadly conflicts of Rwanda, Burundi, and the Democratic Republic of Congo and the killing fields of Cambodia. As well as Syria and Yemen and the genocide committed during the war in the former Yugoslavia.

Today's Gospel reading is therefore very relevant. Luke's Gospel today is commonly referred to as the 'apocalyptic discourse.' Whilst reading apocalyptic literature may have caused some to despair and lose hope, it was actually meant to signify that God is in control of history and that punishment of the wicked will come about by God's doing. Jesus tells us in today's Gospel that we must remain faithful throughout trials and ordeals to the end. Jesus also foretells of the destruction of Jerusalem which occurred in A.D 70.

During times of war and conflict it is understandable that some may look upon man's inhumanity to man and conclude that the end times are upon us. Earthquakes and plagues, famines are predicted and have been a constant feature throughout history.

However, the ideal way to accept Jesus' apocalyptic message is always to be ready to face our death. We must live holy lives of selfless love, mercy, compassion, and unconditional forgiveness, remembering the demands of justice in our day-to-day lives. We must also take time to rest and to pray in order to keep our

hearts alive to God's presence with us and within us. Daily examination of our conscience at bedtime, asking God's pardon and forgiveness, also prepares us to face God at any time to give an account of our lives.

Millions of men and women who sacrificed their lives for our freedom went forward with courage in selfless acts of bravery. Their sacrifice is what we remember today, not in a way which glorifies the terrible reality of war, but in a way of remembrance and gratitude that for our tomorrow they gave their today.

At the Going down of the Sun and in the morning we will remember them.
