Dear Friends

The waiting and expectation finally came to an end last Saturday evening, with our 'hopes' once again dashed, and our dreams of glory put on hold once more for another four years - football is still not 'coming home'. So whilst Argentina and France continue to dream ahead of Sunday's World Cup final, England's football team and fans prepare for four more years of preparation and waiting.

who knock on the door of our hearts. Let us remain watchful in humility and availability' as we wait in joyful hope for Jesus the Christ who, unlike our football, does not and will not disappoint.

This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

Today we hear the account of Joseph and his unquestioning obedience to God.

When Joseph is told that his fiancée Mary is pregnant his life is thrown into turmoil. He is betrothed to Mary and knows that the child she is expecting is not his. It would be completely understandable for him to believe that Mary has been unfaithful. Joseph is a 'man of honour' and under the laws of his people, he had the right to name and shame Mary publicly, and put her on trial and if found guilty, stoned to death. (Dt. 22:23-30).

However, Joseph does not want to risk her life and her reputation or of the child she carries, so he decides to put her away discreetly, avoid publicity, and to allow her as much dignity and safety as possible.

Joseph, a 'man of honour' a devout Jew is caught between the law and equity, upholding principles, and displaying compassion, adhering to the standards of the day yet not wishing to humiliate others, between judgement and openness. Above all, Joseph believed in the dignity of every human person, no matter what they have done, or the rumours say they have done.

Joseph's story goes to the heart of Advent. Unawares he makes space for the miracle of Christmas because he seeks to protect life, restore honour, and demonstrate compassion in a world where life is cheap, discredit easy, and mercy rare. And he keeps doing so in the years ahead: as he searches high and low for a place for his wife to give birth securely, as he eludes Herod's grip and takes both Madonna and Child to safety in Egypt, and as he leads the search for the adolescent Boy when He goes missing. Joseph foreshadows the Christmas God who offers safety to every human soul, redemption where there has been dishonour, and mercy to the whole human race!

What a wonderful example Joseph is to all of us. Rather than condemn he applies mercy. In a world where we like to think we are all merciful, the sad truth is we are far too quick sometimes



to judge and condemn. Our modern society encourages this. A society that likes to build up and then pull-down people who are considered a threat or not like us. Joseph shows us the right way to be.

Over the past four weeks, we have been preparing a way for the Lord in our minds and hearts and lives. We've observed a reverse chronology: in the first week of Advent, we focused on the future, the end of time, in recognition of who Jesus will be when He comes again – as Judge (Mt 24:37-44). In the second and third weeks we addressed the present, with an acknowledgement of who Jesus is – the Christ (Mt 3:1-12; 11:2-11). Now on the fourth Sunday we look back two thousand years to His conception in appreciation of who He was for our sakes – the Messiah who took on human form. All time – past, present, and future – are contained within the four walls of Advent.
