A thought from Fr Liam...becoming as the Prince of Peace

Dear Friends

Amidst the ongoing horror and trauma of the earthquakes in Syria and Turkey, we have also witnessed in these past weeks signs of hope in the historic and unprecedented ecumenical pilgrimage of Peace to South Sudan by Pope Francis, Archbishop Justin Welby and Moderator Iain Greenshields. It is not insignificant that the message of solidarity and peace, dialogue and humility that they promoted and preached was modelled through their actions of shared discipleship, fraternal love and respect for each other and their respective churches, for as Francis underlined, 'prior to any historical divisions there remains one unchanging fact, namely that we are Christians – we belong to Christ.'

This unprecedented pilgrimage is in response to the scandal of war, violence and division that has disfigured South Sudan for too long and witnessed 400,000 people killed and up to 4 million people displaced. This joint pilgrimage has allowed our three Christian leaders to meet with the women, children and men who have been forced to flee their homes to escape violence, to pray for peace and an end to division, and to support and encourage political leaders to actively continue the journey towards peace and justice for all, for 'we journey towards unity when love is concrete, when we join in coming to the aid of the outcast, the wounded and the disenfranchised.'

In 2019 leaders from South Sudan, including President Salva Kiir and his rival, the former rebel leader Riek Machar, travelled to the Vatican to meet with Pope Francis. He urged them both to seek out what unites them and overcome what divides them, ensuring them that peace was possible. At the end of the meeting Pope Francis knelt down and kissed their feet saying 'I am asking you as a brother to stay in peace. I am asking you with my heart, let us go forward.'

It is often said that peace begins in the heart of one person, reaching out in love to the other beyond their own needs. As we pray for renewed peace and healing across South Sudan, may the Lord grace us with the vision and wisdom to become in our own lives what we are praying for - peace.

I wish you and yours a blessed and peaceful week.

This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

In today's Gospel we continue our examination of the Sermon on the Mount. The Gospel readings for both today and last week are perhaps the hardest actions for us to practice as Christians. Perhaps we interpret the words to suit our own world view and to help us feel better about ourselves when we invariably fall short of the exacting and demanding standards Jesus sets for us in this Sermon. However, to do so is to ignore the true meaning of Christ's message contained in these passages. Jesus turns the old understanding of Mosaic law regarding retaliation on its head. For Jesus retaliation has no place in the Christian life. Jesus instructs us to accept with grace offenses that we suffer. To do so requires great strength and discipline. When we encounter evil, we are expected to counter it with kindness.

Jesus tells us that we are to turn the other cheek, to forgive the offense. He uses the examples of surrendering not just the coat when sued for it but to offer the shirt we own as well. We defuse conflict by giving more than is required. When a Roman soldier forced a person to carry a burden for a mile, which was part of Roman law, Jesus gives the instruction to go the extra mile, to accept unjust treatment in a spirit of service.

Let us ask ourselves how we truly feel about these commands? Do we think that Jesus did not really mean what he said in these passages? People who have taken these words literally have practised pacifism down through the ages. As Christians we are challenged to contemplate these words and act upon them. We are to love our neighbours and forgive our enemies. We are called to be set apart from others by our ability to treat others with kindness and respect, even when they show no remorse and continue to try to harm us. These are tough words. Tough instructions to follow. To just love our friends and families is easy and does not set us apart at

all. We are to forgive again and again. We are to pardon wrong after wrong, to pray for our enemies, even when they do not deserve it.

This is what we will be judged upon when we stand in front of God. We are kidding ourselves if we think we can feel contempt and harbour ill will to those we dislike whilst standing in the presence of the blessed sacrament, whilst praising God through public displays of prayer and song, and feeling we are righteous. We can fool everybody and even ourselves, but we can never fool God.

The Sermon on the Mount is a timely reminder and should be a constant meditation for all of us as to how we should truly be living our lives.
