This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

The season of Lent provides us with a time of spiritual preparation. It is an opportunity to seek to conquer our temptations, and to look at the example provided for us by Jesus during his forty days in the desert, before he undertook his public ministry.

During Lent we especially look to our sins and the opportunity to repent and to renew our lives as we journey with Our Lord to the ultimate victory and the celebration of Easter and the resurrection. The readings for this weekend remind us that we are always faced with temptations. What we need to pray for is the continuing grace of God to conquer our temptations and practice the disciplines of prayer, self-control, fasting, almsgiving and charity. The Gospel accounts found in Matthew and Luke are very detailed and reveal the purpose of the Devil was to tempt Jesus away from his salvific mission to die for all of us, and to use his power to become, instead, a political messiah according to the Jewish expectation, and to avoid suffering and death. The temptations of Christ are presented as power, prestige and prosperity.

These temptations are relevant for all of us today. The temptation for power, prestige and prosperity are closely linked with wanting more of everything and the ability to control our own destiny and of others. Matthew presents the three temptations, 'turn stones into bread', 'throw yourself from the top of the Temple', and 'worship Satan.' These temptations of Christ are what many of us experience in our own lives. The temptation to satisfy personal needs by accumulating material possessions, the temptation to achieve miracles by using spiritual power not for the good of others but for our own benefit. Then there is the temptation to seek political power or personal prestige by using evil instead of good.

Jesus serves as a model for us in conquering temptations by strengthening himself through prayer, penance, and the active use of the Word of God. Lent is the perfect time to practice daily our spiritual exercises, to use Jesus as our model and to grow in grace.

Pope Francis: Our Lenten journey is synodal: In his Message for Lent 2023, Pope Francis highlights the relationship between the Lenten journey and the synodal journey, which are both rooted in tradition and open to newness.

Personal and ecclesial 'transfiguration' is the goal of the ascetical journey of Lent, and similarly of the synodal process.

Pope Francis takes his inspiration from the Gospel account of the Transfiguration, proclaimed each year on the Second Sunday of Lent. As with the chosen disciples at the Transfiguration, Jesus "takes us with Him to a place apart" during the season of Lent.

"Lenten penance," he writes, "is a commitment, sustained by grace, to overcoming our lack of faith and our resistance to following Jesus on the way of the cross."

This requires effort, sacrifice, and concentration, which are also requirements for the Synodal Journey; and therefore we can say that "our Lenten journey is 'synodal' since we make it together along the same path, as disciples of the one Master."
