### A thought from Fr Liam...

'Many people want to return to normality ...but the pandemic is a crisis, and we do not emerge from a crisis the same as before: either we come out of it better, or we come out of it worse. We must come out of it better, .... Today we have an opportunity to build something different.' (Pope Francis, General Audience, August 2019)

Almost exactly three years ago on 27th March 2020 a frail yet determined Pope Francis emerged into the midst of a rainswept and empty St Peter's Square to pray for and with a world engulfed in the storm of the Covid-19 pandemic. He reminded us that the Lord is 'calling on us to seize this time of trial as a time of choosing' – not as a time of God's judgement, but a time of 'our judgement: a time to choose what matters and what passes away, a time to separate what is necessary from what is not...a time to get our lives back on track with regard to you, Lord, and to others.'

As we journey through Lent in 2023, three years after this extraordinary evening in Rome, I wonder how we are doing? For in the midst of the pandemic, and the disruption and trauma that it brought to our lives and our world, we perhaps each committed both personally and as a church, to become something different, to reshape our lives, to cast off all those things we had discovered that were really not that important, all those trivialities that were fleeting and often hindered, rather than helped, our own wellbeing and the flourishing of our world. Much has happened since March 2020 in our own lives, in our Church and the wider world, but the wisdom and truth that we each rediscovered and collectively discerned during Covid remains potently pertinent for the ongoing renewal of our lives and that of our world and church.

What is it that we rediscovered and discerned during Covid about deep and lasting happiness, in our lives with God and each other, that we have yet to put back at the heart of our journey and our Church? Perhaps it's time for us all to remember and recommit to living anew the wisdom that God uncovered within us during the Covid pandemic, and 'choose what matters'

from 'what passes away'; to separate once again 'what is necessary from what is not' on our shared pilgrimage of life.

'When the storm passes, I ask you Lord, that you return us better, as you once dreamed us.'

I wish you and yours a blessed and peaceful fifth week of Lent.

#### This Week's Good News

Dear Friends,

With just two weeks now until Easter, we have reached the climax of the three long Gospel passages from St. John, read successively on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, In turn we have heard John's account of the meeting with the Samaritan woman at the well, the giving of sight to the man born blind, and today the raising of Lazarus. These passages have been specifically chosen for the instruction of those preparing for reception into the Church according to the Rite of the Christian Initiation of Adults, and in our parish, we have Helen and Maxi. On each of these Sundays, after the homily, the Rite of Scrutiny takes place. The candidates are prayed over in community. Last week they received the Creed, the basis of what we believe as Catholics. This weekend they will receive the Lord's prayer.

The raising of Lazarus in today's Gospel is a revelation, a sign, of the power that Jesus has over death. John explains this good news of salvation through a long narrative which involves not just Lazarus but also on the relationship Jesus has with the sisters of Lazarus, Martha, and Mary. In this account we witness the grief of the sisters at the loss of their brother, but also, we see confusion from them as they do not understand why in their view, Jesus did not act to prevent Lazarus from dying. Just as Jesus cured the son of the official lying sick in Capernaum with just a word, they do not understand why Jesus could not have done the same for Lazarus. However, Jesus tells them why he allowed Lazarus to die: 'so that you will see the glory of God'. This glory is revealed when God reaches into the depths of despair and turns it into perfect joy. This glory is revealed in the power that Jesus has over death.



Please familiarise yourselves with the location of the fire exits, extinguishers, and assembly points at this church.

In today's Gospel we see Jesus at the tomb of his friend: distressed, anguished, weeping. This a sign and foretaste of his own passion, which is clearly imaged in the details of the burial cave with a stone over its entrance, and in the burial cloths of Lazarus. God's response to our suffering is seen in Jesus: in his tears, his prayer, his grief, and in the anticipation of his own death. So the tears of Jesus are a revelation, and also a permission. We are supposed to feel pain, and to hate it. We are also allowed to be baffled at God, and even angry with him, when dreadful things occur. All that is summed up for us next Sunday, in the Passion of Jesus. But then we have the Sunday that follows: the centre of our year, and of our life; the focus of our hope, and our joy; the ultimate answer to all life's questions: which is the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.
